Summer Reading Assignment

Happy Summer, Class of 2025!

I'm excited to be your Literature teacher next year and to put on a Shakespeare play with you in the spring!

Before all that, I'd like you to do two things this summer:

First, read an age-appropriate biography, autobiography, or memoir of a person you admire.

Please keep a log of vocabulary words that are new to you or less familiar. On the first day of school, please submit a list of at least 20 words from the book you read, along with their definitions.

Create a one-page (8.5" x 11" or 11" x 14") visual review of the book. Include basic information: title, author, year of publication, and genre. Overall, would you give the book a thumbs-down or a thumbs-up? What is great about the book? What could be better? What group or age is the best audience for the book? Would this be a good book to adapt into a movie? Who would play major roles? Please DO reveal the ending! Use pictures and short bullets for this exercise. Think of this as an advertisement to convince people to read (or to avoiding reading) the book. Bring your visual review on the first day of school and be prepared to present it to the class the first week of school.

Next, please write a short essay (due the first day of school) about the subject of the book, the person who is the topic of the biography, autobiography, or memoir. In the essay, please consider the following and other questions: What did you learn about the person that you didn't know before? What is one obstacle the person has overcome? How did she

or he overcome this challenge or obstacle? What are some of the traits or qualities of this person? How do your feelings about the person compare to before you read the book? Is this person a good role model? Why or why not? As you write about the person, provide specific details. Give concrete examples of events or actions from the person's life to support your answers. Aim for about 625 words, but I'm more worried about quality then length. The essay, the visual review, and the vocabulary log will be graded (150 points). I'll grade this for the quality of your work: your creativity; the thoughtfulness of your ideas; using proper spelling, punctuation, grammar, and capitalization; effort.



Second, stay in touch! Get out in the world! Use your local post office. Visit a museum or a park or go to a live play or concert. This park, museum, play, or concert can be local or a place you visit on vacation. Admission may be free! There are lots of free museums and concerts in and around DC and Northern VA throughout the summer. Send me a postcard with a couple of sentences about your experience. The postcard can, but doesn't have to, depict where you went (I'm not sure you can get a postcard of all parks or concerts...). What did you see or hear or do? What did you like best? Would you recommend this place for other 8th graders? for teachers? Why or why not? Please mail the postcard (postmarked on or before August 1, 2024) to:

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History Summer Assignments, June 2024 Mr. Riordan

Historic Site Visit Report for Grades 6, 7, 8 (same assignment for all three grades)

History students! You live in the midst of arguably the most historic region of our country! Take advantage by becoming a history buff this summer.

STEP 1: Choose a historic site to visit this summer (probably on a family trip, but if it's nearby, you could visit on your own or with friends). Your site can be ANYWHERE in the U.S.A., but a list of links to well-known local and regional sites is below. The definition of "historic site" is broad. Any place where history happened, can qualify.

While on your visit, be curious! Make observations, take notes, ask questions of a guide or park ranger, pick up interpretive material, and take photos to remind you of what you saw and learned.

STEP 2: After your visit, you will compile a one-page illustrated document about your trip. Do this on a 8.5" x 11" piece of white or colored paper (you can use a bigger sheet if you want, but I am NOT requesting a poster!). This must be a hand-made document – not made on a computer and printed out.

Your document should graphically and visually represent the historic site you visited and what you learned there. It is NOT an essay or a book report. Think of it more like a homemade brochure. (**OPTIONAL:** If you actually want to make it a folded brochure with three panels, you can then use BOTH sides of the paper).

You should use headlines, short phrases, fun facts, and colorful hand-drawn illustrations / doodles to create your report. Please use a tool like colored markers or colored pencils. Squeeze in as much as you can on one page, and make it visually interesting as well as educational. I expect you to spend a few hours on this product, making it look as good and complete as you can.





In some way, your report should include these topics:

- Name and location of the historic site (how about a hand-drawn location map?)
- Why it is important to American history, Virginia history, or local history.
- Highlights of what you saw and learned there.
- The date you visited.

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• Put your full name (first and last) on the FRONT in the bottom right corner.

You will turn this in on paper on the first day of History class. Please make something that you will be proud to see hanging in the hallway. This assignment will be graded and worth 10 points (which is the equivalent of half a chapter test, normally).
